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He is author (with Daniel Ziblatt) of How Democracies Die (Crown, 2018), a New York Times Best-Seller that has been published in 25 languages, Competitive Authoritarianism: Hybrid Regimes after the Cold War (with Lucan Way) (Cambridge, 2010), and Transforming Labor-Based Parties in Latin America: Argentine Peronism in Comparative Perspective (Cambridge, 2003), and co-editor of Informal Institutions and Democracy in Latin America (with Gretchen Helmke) and The Resurgence of the Latin American Left (with Kenneth Roberts).

He has written frequently for the New York Times, Foreign Affairs, Vox, The New Republic, The Monkey Cage, La República (Peru) and Folha de São Paulo (Brazil). He is currently writing a book (with Lucan Way) on the durability of revolutionary regimes. Levitsky received his PhD from the University of California, Berkeley.


How Democracies Die

In this thought-provoking lecture, Daniel Ziblatt and Steven Levitsky delve into the history of where democracy has failed in Latin America and Europe, and explain their four-part test for identifying authoritarian leaders. Drawing on decades of research, they explain the two crucial traditions, mutual tolerance and forbearance, that have allowed American democracy to survive for so long—and the greatest threats to its future. Ziblatt and Levitsky leave

audiences with concrete actions they can take to bolster democracy everywhere, such as building alliances that extend beyond traditional party lines, defending institutions, and mobi-lizing the vote.
